• Foster Homes

- Socialize and evaluate animals before adoption
- Provide basic care and love
- Handle basic medical items like worming, flea treatment, antibiotics, etc. Food and meds provided by the group











- Special Needs Foster Homes
 - All basic care plus special medications, subq fluids, insulin shots, etc., for care of diabetics, FELV, heart conditions, and cerebral hyperplasia kittens.
 - Also neonatal emergency care.







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NOAH – Foster Home Based Rescue



- Foster Care People expect:
 - Support from the group including food, medicine, advice, and help for vacations
 - Some level of defined time length that animal will be housed
 - Clear policies and guidelines











- Honoring the Foster Care contract
- Some level of commitment to the organization
- Adherence to the training guidelines for care
- Good level of care for the animal
- The goal is a permanent home for the animal



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Foster Home Guidelines

- All owned animals in house medically up-todate
- Fostered animal(s) kept separate from owned animals
- Foster for only one rescue group at a time
- Commit to spending time with animal(s)
- Commit to reporting animal(s) progress







Foster Home Guidelines

- Volunteer spirit honored by encouraging feedback. Also, out of pocket costs to volunteer minimized



- Medical decision responsibility clearly defined by Rescue Group
- Adoption procedure clearly defined by Rescue Group (including adopting a fostered animal)







Finding Foster Homes



- Display brochures/flyers in animal friendly locations.
- Recruit from your adopters/happy tale list
- Use media to recruit (local newspaper, cable and radio spots)
- Utilize Petfinder volunteer base and Craigs list volunteer section







Foster Home Screening

- Foster Care application formal and thorough just like your adoption application
 - Create a formal Foster Care agreement
- Check references and verify owned animal medical information
- Do a home visit
- Create a training program and require it!









- Rescue Philosophy
 - No kill rescue
 - Behavior and medical issues
- Sanitation
 - Importance of a clean environment
 - Cleaning solutions do's and don'ts
 - Cleaning after an outbreak of disease

Medical Issues and Decisions



- A sick animal in a Foster Care Home presents a dilemma for the Rescue Group
 - Competent assessment of the animal
 - Care for the animal
 - Exposure of other foster animals in that home
 - Attachment of the Foster Care volunteer
 - Contact with the vets
 - Weighing life and death options



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Medical Issues and Decisions



- Written policy in the Foster Care agreement covering medical care, decisions and, authorizing veterinary visits
- NOAH has a very strict policy
 - No vet care without consulting one of the Rescue Team
 - If a team member is not available, only stabilization is authorized until the Team is reached
 - Any unauthorized medical care will be the responsibility of the Foster Care volunteer







Adoption Procedures

- Rescue Group Adoption Models
 - 1. Adoptions done by Foster Care people from their homes
 - 2. Adoptions done at a location where Foster Care people bring the animals for the day
 - 3. Adoptions done by a team at a permanent Adoption location. (NOAH adopts through PetSmart using our Adoption counselors. Little interaction between adoptees and our Foster Care volunteers)







Adoption Procedures

- Foster Care home adopting an animal they fostered
 - 1. Charge a fee to cover the medical cost
 - 2. Encouraged or discouraged?
 - If the Foster adopts to the exclusion of time and space to foster, then Rescue Group suffers
 - If the Foster can't adopt, then they suffer







Foster Home Retention



• Make volunteers feel appreciated:

- Support them
- Be available
- Offer options when you observe stress or burnout
- Offer opportunities to participate in other aspects of the organization









Foster Home Retention

- Common Pitfalls
 - Too many animals for too long
 - Losing an animal
 - Unauthorized emergency vet care
 - Unrealistic expectation that the Rescue Group can "save the whole world."









- Needs board level support and active involvement
- Very demanding emotionally and time wise
- It is extremely rewarding volunteer work
